 Leeds, is a village, township, and  
 chapelry, comprising 973 acres, and  
 2126 inhabitants. The *Church*, built  
 about 1777, is a curacy, valued at  
 £104, in the patronage of the vicar  
 of Batley. The *Society of Friends*,  
 the Baptists, and the Methodists, have  
 chapels here. The *Free School* is  
 endowed with about £14 a year.

MORLEY, a large clothing village, 4 miles S.S.W. of Leeds, has in its township the following hamlets, and 2590 acres of land, and 4822 inhabitants. The Earl of Dartmouth is lord of the manor, and works a stone quarry in the township. The ancient episcopal chapel (St Mary,) was leased for 500 years, in the reign of Charles the First, to Presbyterians, and is still used by Independent Calvinists, who have also another chapel here, built in 1834, and one at Middlethorpe, built in 1852. The Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have likewise chapels here, the latter built in 1835, and the former rebuilt in 1808, and enlarged in 1837. *Morley and Churwell District Church* (St. Peter,) is at Four-lane-ends, and was built under the million act, in 1829 and '30, at the cost of £2954. It is an elegant structure, and is a perpetual curacy, valued at £150, in the patronage of the Vicar of Batley. Here are two *National Schools* and a *Mechanics' Institute*, and Lodges of Freemasons, Odd Fellows, Foresters, and Free Gardeners. A *Branch Savings Bank* was established here in 1851, and Mr. W. S. King is its secretary. Near *Stump Cross*, is the porch and some remains of *Howley Hall*, formerly a seat of the noble family of Savile. On Morley Common is a

STATION on the Leeds and Dewsbury RAILWAY, and near it are *Morley Gas Works*, constructed in 1849, at the cost of £4500, in £5 shares.

Marked 1, reside at *Bruntcliffe Thorn*; 2, *Stump Cross*; 3, *Four Lane-ends*; 4, *Howley*; 5, *Scholecroft*; and the rest in *Morley*, and *Morley Hole*.
